

Debbie Dingell was elected to represent the 12th District in 2014. She successfully fought to have women included in federally-funded health research, and advocated for greater awareness of issues directly related to women's health, including breast cancer and women's heart health. She is a founder and past chair of the National Women's Health Resource Center and the Children's Inn at the National Institutes of Health (NIH). She has served on numerous boards related to women's issues including the advisory boards for the NIH Panel for Women's Research, the Michigan Women's Economic Club, the Susan B. Komen Foundation, and the board of the Michigan Women's Foundation. She was a co-founder of both the first Race for the Cures in Michigan and in Washington, D.C.

Debbie leads a number of efforts and initiatives related to young people and education stemming from her role as a WSU Governor and co-chair of the Children's Leadership Council, a business-led advocacy group that promotes investment in early childhood education. She chaired the Michigan Infant Mortality Task Force, the Baby Your Baby public education campaign that reduced infant mortality rates in Michigan, and has served on the board of Michigan's Children, the only statewide independent voice working to ensure that public policies are made in the best interest of children from cradle to career. She was appointed by Michigan Governor Jennifer Granholm to serve on the Early Childhood Investment Corporation and the Cherry Commission on Higher Education and Economic Growth.

Debbie is a member of the Democratic National Committee and has chaired numerous political campaigns. Much of her recent work has been focused on ethical issues and social responsibility as they relate to government and business. She co-chaired One United Michigan, which sought to preserve and support programs that ensure equal opportunity in Michigan. She chairs the Metropolitan Affairs Coalition, a statewide organization that brings business, labor and government together to find commonality on issues. She continues to serve on the Parade Company board of directors of which she is past chair, where she helped save America's Thanksgiving Parade, an important Detroit tradition. A known "bridge-builder," she continues to promote and lead efforts toward greater understanding among people of differing points of views and backgrounds.

Debbie is a respected voice in Michigan. She co-hosted Detroit Public Television's "Am I Right," regularly served as a panelist on "Flashpoint," a public affairs program on WDIV-TV4 Detroit, and was named one of the 100 Most Influential Women in Michigan by Crain's Detroit Business. She resides in Dearborn with her husband Congressman John D. Dingell of Michigan. She holds both a B.S.F.S. in Foreign Services and an M.S. in Liberal Studies from Georgetown University.

## WASHTENAW COUNTYWIDE OFFICIALS

## **Prosecuting Attorney Brian Mackie**



Brian L. Mackie is the Washtenaw County prosecuting attorney. A Democrat, he was elected to his first four-year term in November 1992, taking office on Jan. 1, 1993.

The prosecuting attorney's office is responsible for all felonies and misdemeanors charged under state law, as well as juvenile deliquency proceedings, terminations of parental rights for abuse and neglect of children and mental health commitments. The office's civil division establishes paternity and child support obligations, and a special unit is devoted to the prosecution of domestic violence and criminal sexual conduct.

Mackie is a member of the Michigan Prosecutors Association and has served as its president. He serves on the board of directors for Dawn Farm, which provides services for addicts and alcoholics seeking recovery.

Mackie is married to Joan Doughty, executive director of the Ann Arbor-based Community Action Network (CAN).

## **Sheriff Jerry Clayton**



Jerry Clayton is the Washtenaw County Sheriff. He was first elected in November 2008 in a countywide race, and reelected in 2012.

Prior to his election, Clayton served in the sheriff's office for 20 years before retiring in 2006. His service included serving as the Washtenaw County Jail administrator just before his retirement. His career also included assignments/appointments as a Corrections Officer, Deputy Sheriff, Shift Sergeant, Operations Lieutenant, County Court Security Commander, SWAT Team Commander, Corrections Division Commander and Police Services Division Commander.

He has been a certified criminal justice trainer and instructor for more than sixteen years, specializing in a multitude of subject areas including: use of force disciplines, physical training, special weapons and tactics, cultural diversity, preventing racial profiling, and in the areas of staff management and supervision, developing customer service delivery strategies, and organizational leadership. He provided consulting services to the U.S. Department of Justice-National Institute of Corrections, assisting in the development and delivery of various training curricula to local, state and federal correctional agencies throughout the United States. Clayton lives in Ypsilanti Township with his wife, Sybil.

## Clerk & Register of Deeds Lawrence Kestenbaum



Larry Kestenbaum is Washtenaw County's Clerk and Register of Deeds. Before becoming county clerk – a full-time position – Kestenbaum worked as a senior archive specialist for University of Michigan's Survey Research Center at the Institute for Social Research.

Kestenbaum was elected to his first four-year term as county clerk in November 2004, taking office on Jan. 1, 2005 after defeating long-time Republican clerk Peggy Haines. He became the first Democrat to hold that office in 72 years. The register of deeds office manages property records for the county, while the clerk's office maintains all vital records – deaths, births and marriages – as well as oversees elections and manages weapons permits and court records. The office also maintains records for the county board of commissioners and the 22nd Circuit Court.

On Saturday, March 22, 2014, following a U.S. District Court ruling that Michigan's ban on same sex marriage was unconstitutional, Kestenbaum was one of four Michigan county clerks to open for special hours while the ruling was in effect. His office issued marriage licenses to 74 gay and lesbian couples.

Kestenbaum is married to Janice Gutfreund. They are active members of Temple Beth Emeth in Ann Arbor.

## **Treasurer Catherine McClary**



Catherine McClary is the Washtenaw County treasurer, a full-time elected position. McClary has held the treasurer's office since Jan. 1, 1997.

The county treasurer is authorized by the Michigan Constitution and state law to serve as the county's banker and investment officer. The treasurer's primary responsibilities are to safeguard public funds and to collect and account for the revenue used to operate programs for county residents.

By virtue of her role as treasurer, McClary also serves on the county's election commission. #### REGIONAL TRANSIT MILLAGE

This new regional transit millage would be collected in addition to the existing SMART and AAATA transit millages. The Master Plan would result in a regional transit millage of 1.2 mills. When approved by voters, the millage would begin in 2017. The regional transit millage would be collected in addition to the existing transit millages in the SMART and AAATA service areas. If the millage is approved by voters, all municipalities within the four county RTA jurisdiction would pay the millage. Communities would not have the option to "opt out" of the millage.

#### ESTIMATED COST

The 1.2 regional transit millage will cost \$1.20 in property tax for every \$1,000 of taxable value of a home.

For the average household in Southeast Michigan with a taxable value of \$78,856, this will cost about \$95 per year, or less than \$8 per month.

### WASHTENAW COUNTY BALLOT PROPOSALS

### Roads Proposal

- Would levy 0.5 mill, Estimated to raise \$7.3 million in the first year for roads, bike lanes, streets and paths.
- . Fund nearly 200 miles of road improvements over the next 4 years.
- 50% of projects funded by tax in cities and villages & 25% in the county's townships are required to include a non-motorized component.
- . The average homeowner would pay about \$35 per year, according to the Washtenaw County Road Commission.
- . Will REPLACE a current 0.5 mill road tax levied by the county.

### Veterans Services Proposal

- Fund financial aid, services, eligible indigent veterans claims, and administration of Washtenaw County's VA.
- County currently levies 0.037 mill veterans tax without a vote of the people, this proposal would levy 0.1 mill.
